### For Infant Mental Health Awareness Week





The government's 'Opportunity Mission' is to "Set every child up for the best start in life."

#### The Mission milestone:

 75% of 5-year-olds reaching a good level of development in the Early Years Foundation Stage assessment – which looks at children's development across areas like language, personal, social and emotional development, and maths and literacy – by 2028.





Keir Starmer's Plan for Change promised to: **Strengthen and join up family services** to improve support through pregnancy and early childhood

 This includes continuing to invest in and build up Family Hubs and Start for Life programmes to support early child health, parenting and home learning programmes, and strengthening health visiting services for all families, and improved early identification of special educational needs and disabilities (SEND).





#### But

- Local Authorities are spending just a quarter of that spend on Sure Start at its peak in 2010.
- Almost half (49%) of Local Authorities report cuts to their budget for children's centres and Family Hubs between 2023/24 and 2024/25

The 11th June Spending Review will set departmental budgets for the next 3 years. We have called for:

- £756m across the three-year spending review period to roll-out the Family Hubs and Start for Life Programme to all upper-tier English local authorities, as recommended by the CQC and Ofsted.
- As part of this, allocate £73m each financial year to enable every local authority area to develop at least one parent-infant team.

This would enable 39,200 vulnerable babies to receive specialist support every year by 2028/29.





#### Also:

- NHS England is being abolished, with changes to ICBs
- A new 10-Year Plan for Health is due in June

We have called for a clear mandate for NHS mental health services to address the infant mental health needs of 0–2-year-olds, including specific targets for outcomes, access, and secondary prevention services, to be reviewed and updated at regular intervals.

## Inquiry

The first 1000 days of life, from conception to age two, are widely recognised as a critical period for child development, shaping long-term health, well-being, and life outcomes. The previous Committee examined this period in its 2019 First 1000 days of life inquiryconsidering national strategy, current spending and barriers to investment and local provision. Since then, there have been a number of significant policy developments in this area. The most notable being the shift to integrated care services (ICSs) under the previous Government in 2022. The
